## 4. ACHIEVEMENTS OF THE KAZA TFCA

In the short time since the KAZA TFCA treaty was signed in August 2011 the programme has surged ahead in leaps and bounds. Here are just a few of our achievements.

- Formulation of development plans and strategies
- Official launch of the KAZA Visa pilot project between the Republics of Zambia and Zimbabwe
- Expansion of communications networks
- Supply of park management equipment and infrastructure
- Construction of park housing and administration facilities (Sioma-Ngwezi National Park, Zambia, and Pandamatenga, Botswana)

- Supporting environmental monitoring programmes
- Securing wildlife dispersal corridors
- Marketing KAZA TFCA as a tourism destination
- Creating awareness about the benefits derived from wildlife dispersal corridors
- Supporting community development projects
- Supporting human wildlife conflict mitigation measures.

The KAZA Visa — Tourism Without Borders

Imagine being able to cross African borders just as you would pass from one country to another in Europe, or move from one state to another in the USA. One of our major achievements has been the agreement to implement a KAZA Visa.

The KAZA visa is a single visa that will allow free movement for tourists between each of the partner countries. The KAZA TFCA launched a KAZA Visa pilot project between the Republics of Zambia and Zimbabwe on 28th November 2014. The KAZA Visa is an SADC initiative, which is being piloted on a small scale within the KAZA TFCA. The pilot phase between the two countries is expected to take six months after which this will be rolled out to the other KAZA TFCA partner countries. The successful implementation of a KAZA Visa would mean that tourists would no longer have to apply for multiple visas in order to travel through these countries. This development will facilitate easy and trouble-free travel for tourists visiting the KAZA TFCA partner countries and thus, promote tourism growth in the region.

The KAZA Visa costs US\$50 and is effective for 30 days as long as one remains within Zambia and Zimbabwe.
